All, persons liable to taxation in the Municipality of ASHLAND, MAINE and all Personal Representatives, Trustees, etc., of all estate table in said municipality of such person are hereby notified to furnish THE ASSESSORS TRUE AND PERFECT LISTS OF ALL THEIR ESTATES, REAL AND PERSONAL, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of **April 2023**, and be prepared to make oath of the truth of the same and to answer all proper inquiries in writing as to the nature, situation and value of their property liable to be taxed.

And when estates of persons deceased have been distributed during the past year, or have changed hands from any cause, the Personal Representative, or other person interested, are hereby warned to give notice of such change, and in default of such notice will be held under the law to pay the tax assessed although such estate has been wholly distributed and paid over.

"Penalties for Non-Compliance"

And any person to whom this notice is mailed who neglects to comply with this notice is hereby barred to his right to make application to the Assessor, Assessors, or Chief Assessor or any appeal therefrom, for any abatement of his taxes, unless he furnishes such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to furnish it at the time appointed.

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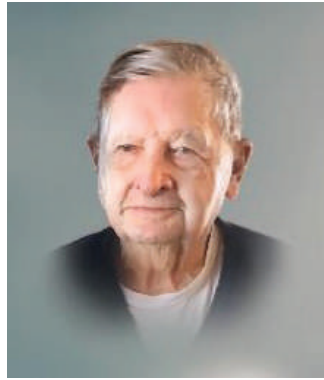

These three people were a large part of Ashland's community. The first is Mr. Patrick Long who started as a Fire Fighter in 1978, then worked on the Ashland Ambulance, and eventually moved up as the Ambulance Director. He has dedicated many hours to the Ambulance and Fire Department. He was well known in the area and many times was called directly at his house to respond on behalf of the Ambulance by residents. He retired in 2022 after 44 years of service and deserves to relax and enjoy his retirement. There was not a place or person that he did not know something about. He was the person I called when I could not figure out a person, where they lived or how they were related. Thank you Pat for everything you have done for this community and the surrounding areas.

The next person is Mr. Rene Cloukey. Mr. Cloukey worked for the Town garage for a long-time doing part time work in the winter doing snow removal. He was a familiar figure and could have been seen frequently snow blowing the sidewalk or in the bucket loader clearing the pathway around the town. I also remember that he always had an orange hat on his head. Though he had a large hat selection, he loved his orange hat. I would stop and talk with him, and I remember he was no nonsense but was always smiling and joking.

The last person was our Boston Post Cane holder, Mr. Clarence R. Moro. Mr. Moro has been a fixture in our community for a very long time. He was a lifelong member of VFW Post 9699. His work ethic was beyond reproach. I once asked Mr. Moro his secret; he said that you just keep going and never slow down. Mr. Moro was constantly seen doing a garden, shoveling snow or his lawn way into his late 90's. While on patrol one stormy day, I went by Moro's house, and low and behold, Mr. Moro was on his roof shoveling snow. Normally that is not uncommon in Northern Maine, but Mr. Moro was 95 at the time. I hated to tell on him, but I called a family member. They informed me that he waited till Mrs. Moro left to go get her hair done and shopping and beelined it to the roof. Mr. Moro was 99 when he passed away and was a month shy of his 100th birthday. Mrs. Moro now holds the Boston Post Cane as Ashland oldest citizen at 97 years young.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.


Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. If I may be of assistance to you in any way, I encourage you to contact one of my six state offices.

Dear Friends,

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles.

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21st century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.


Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. The bipartisan *CHIPS Act* will bring home the manufacturing of the technical components known as "chips" that are used in everything these days – from smartphones to microwaves to cars – and in doing so reduce prices and create good American jobs. We also passed the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)* to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Mary and I wish you a happy, and safe 2023.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

In August, I voted for the *Inflation Reduction Act* because it represented a dramatic turnaround from misguided efforts to pass sweeping, ill-designed legislation that tried to accomplish too many things through budget gimmicks, setting up problematic fiscal cliffs in numerous programs and refusing to make the difficult decisions to allow for a fiscally responsible bill.

The *Inflation Reduction Act*, which was signed into law by the president, was fiscally responsible and targeted four key priorities: reducing our national debt and putting our country back on a more sustainable path, lowering the cost of prescription drugs, and making health care more affordable, investing in an all-of-the-above energy strategy to significantly increase oil, gas, and renewable energy production to lower energy costs for Americans, and cracking down on the tax avoidance of billion-dollar multinational corporations. This bill was the first major legislation in the last decade to use the reconciliation process to create a fiscally responsible budget to reduce deficits. The Congressional Budget Office estimated it would reduce deficits by approximately \$300 billion.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I also helped pass the Fiscal Year 2023 National Defense Authorization Act, which among other things, included key wins for Bath shipbuilders, UMaine, and servicemembers and their families. For shipbuilders, the bill secured authorization for a third DDG-51 destroyer; established a new contract for up to 15 DDG-51 destroyers over the next five years, many of which will be built at Bath Iron Works; and included funding for shipyard infrastructure. The bill also authorized over \$25 million for defense research programs, including UMaine's large-scale manufacturing program. Finally, the bill authorized a 4.6% pay increase to help servicemembers and their families deal with rising costs due to inflation.

Additionally, at the end of 2022, Congress passed a spending bill to fund the government through September of 2023. The bill funds nearly \$27 million in funding for community projects across the Second Congressional District, a lifeline for our lobster industry that freezes any regulatory action for at least six years, and secures millions in additional funding for the Low Income Housing Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help Mainers heat their homes.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. 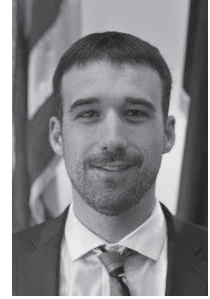

As we are slowly getting back to the norm of dealing with the Covid epidemic, we see that interacting with one another is becoming a little easier. I stress again that the Northern Maine residents have some great ethics and we will overcome any challenge.

The revaluation has been completed and the adjustment to house values is now at a true value. We are still working hard to get businesses to come to town, but the workforce continues to be an issue. I am working to get a grant from American Rescue Plan Act (APRA) funds to develop a housing project to address housing issues as well.

New businesses welcomed into town this year were “The Old Post Cafe” owned by Kay O’Clair and Guy Clark. The Cafe is located by the Ashland 1 Stop and has been serving some wonderful food. Sheridan saw the opening of “The Outdoor Extreme” owned by Clyde Hafford Jr. and his wife, Krissy Hafford. The new shop sells snowmobile gear and clothing. Please stop by either business and see what they have to offer. We also welcomed the new “Irving Housing Complex” located where the old Four Seasons restaurant/hotel was. Irving is utilizing the building to house their employees from outside of the area. So far, they have a cook house and 12 residential mini apartments. We also had 2 businesses change hands; The “Ashland Food Mart” was sold to Chris Walker and now Leon Buckingham was finally able to retire. “Gateway Variety” was sold to Troy White and is now called “The Gateway Trading Post”. We wish the previous owner, Dennis Beaulier, Good Luck to your future endeavors.

We were also able to get funding from Senator Susan Collins in the amount of \$14,400,000 to reconstruct Route 11 From Ashland to Eagle Lake. This was awarded late this fall in December and comes at a good time to fix the Route 11 corridor. Current road conditions have been rated poor to very poor by the Maine Department of Transportation and Federal Highway Administration.

I have tried very hard to keep the Mil-Rate the same or drop it down a little every year. Eventually, I feel we will start growing again as a community. I continue to hold both the Town Manager and the Chief of Police positions. Please feel free to stop in or call if you have any questions or concerns. In closing, I want to express my gratitude to the employees of the Town of Ashland that continue to do an excellent job to serve the residents of Ashland. I also would like to Thank the Town Council in their continuing guidance and support. I look forward to another great year.

The fees for licensing neutered/spayed dogs are \$6.00 and require a neutering/spaying certificate. Dogs that are not neutered/spayed or fail to provide a certificate are \$11.00. A rabies certificate (not the tag) is also required at the time of licensing. If a dog is not registered by January 31st, a \$25.00 late fee per dog will be assessed.

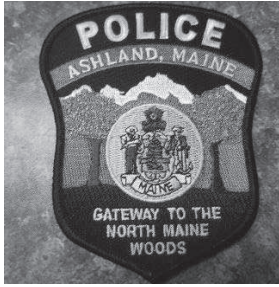

ASHLAND CODE ENFORCEMENT

To the Citizens of Ashland,

Many thanks again to the Ashland Planning Board, Chairperson Billie Theriault, George Baker, Mark Rafford, Sammi Jimmo LaBelle, and Jim Risner, for their dedicated service to the town. They have been a critical part of decision making this past year on a few not so, “everyday,” challenges. They are serving the people of Ashland very well.

I would also like to thank Margaret Pierce our LPI and Deputy CEO for not only doing her job very well, but for going above and beyond in her assistance with the project of updating our Shoreland zoning ordinance.

The number of Building/Demolition permits issued in 2022 was 37. You may have noticed a couple of larger projects going on; the solar farm in Sheridan and the demolition/reconstruction at the site of the old Four Seasons restaurant and motel.

Please be aware that **all** structures require a permit whether built on-site or pre-built, as well as replacing existing structures.

Please be advised that all building construction in Maine, with some exceptions, is governed by the Maine Uniform Building Code and Uniform Energy Code (“MUBEC” “MUBC” “MUEC”), which is adopted by the Technical Building Codes and Standards Board by rule in Chapters 1 through 6, pursuant to 10 M.R.S §9721, *et seq.*

New this year for all full structure demolitions. Attached to the permit application will be a form that will need to be signed by the manager of the Ashland Transfer Station before it can be approved. The form simply states that you have discussed with the manager of the transfer station how the debris of the demolition will be taken care of. This will hopefully eliminate any misunderstandings. Also, before demolition takes place, there is a form that the State of Maine requires to be filled out and mailed prior to demolition. Maine Department of Environmental Protection requests that structures be checked for asbestos and all the debris be disposed of properly.

Please feel free to call or stop by Tuesdays from 7:30 am to 4:00 pm at the Town Office, 435-2311 or by appointment.

2022 ACTIVITY

TIMBER OPERATIONS - 2022

The Town of Ashland harvest operations took place in the 1st and 4th quarters of 2022. In late February and early March, timber harvesting took place on town property off of Rt. 163. This operation produced 522.29 cords of mixed wood, heavy to softwood and poplar. In November, timber harvesting took place on the end of the Wrightville Road. This harvest produced 372.58 cords of primarily hardwood for the 2022 fiscal year and operations carried over into 2023 on this site. A cut-to-length harvest system was utilized for these operations. A mix of thinning and overstory removal prescriptions were implemented.

All the above volume was delivered in 2022.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION - 2022

There was no new road construction in 2022. Most of the Town’s lands have roads in place however, most have been neglected and are not suitable to support harvesting operations. In 2022 approximately 1 mile of existing road was upgraded to current summer haul road specs. Work included widening out the right-of-way, ditching, drainage culvert installations, and adding material to the driving surface. This work was done in support of future harvest plans. This type of work will be common in future years.

BOUNDARY LINE RENEWAL - 2022

Since taking over the management of the Town's lands, a lot of effort has been made to understand the conditions of the boundary lines associated with Town owned lots. Some lots have great boundary lines that are in good condition, some have no established boundaries at all, and some fall in between where evidence can be found, but maintenance is required. We are at a point now where we have prioritized this line work and have scheduled 2.5 miles of boundary line to be renewed in 2023. We also have plans for some survey work in 2023.

2023 PLANNED ACTIVITY**TIMBER OPERATIONS - 2023**


Harvesting operations for 2023 will again be split between the 1st and 4th quarters. Plans are to harvest a portion of a lot off of the Belleville Road in January. This area hasn't seen any harvesting in 20+ years and has over-mature softwood and poplar that is experiencing mortality. The second part of the harvesting plan for the year will be a fall harvest on the road that was upgraded during the summer of 2022.

GENERAL MARKETS REVIEW - 2023

Markets were strong throughout 2022 and the outlook for 2023 looks similar. We have seen some reduction in pricing of certain products as demand has slowed for lumber but, we have seen increases on others as mills struggle to build inventory. Low grade wood markets are very good right now.

In closing we would like to thank the Town of Ashland for the opportunity to provide forest management services on the town owned timberlands and look forward to a productive 2022.

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Independent Auditors' Report

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Ashland, Maine, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town of Ashland's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Ashland, Maine, as of December 31, 2022, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. The Ashland Water and Sewer District Trustees would like to start by thanking the staff for their hard work, due diligence and dedication throughout 2022.

It was another busy year with the District replacing 1 more hydrant at B&A Station, and looking to replace as many as possible this year. We still have a handful of the original hydrants in town that should be retired.

With the new tank being on line for over a year now we still have one last piece to the puzzle. The last piece is a new control panel here at the water plant to finish upgrading the old system. The technology is outdated and it is time to update the older technology. The panel was on back order for over a year due to supply chain issues. With the new panel installed the town should be in good shape for many years to come.

The District was required to test for PFAS in the drinking water this year, (otherwise known as the forever chemical) and the results came back as ND which means non-detect. The limit set by the state is 20 parts per trillion. The information will be listed on the annual CCR flyer which is sent to each customer with the April billing.

This year it looks like DOT is going to be paving through Ashland on RT. 11 and on RT.163, so that will be the main project for the District this year, bringing manhole covers and gate box covers to grade.
